DEI Commitment and Action

Equity is at the heart of the Dress for Success mission, and we are re-affirming our commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion. While diversity, equity and inclusion were already part of our strategic plan, the events of 2020 shook us to the core as an organization, particularly because 65% of the women we serve are Black or African American.

The vision of Dress for Success is a world where women do not live in poverty, are treated with dignity and respect and are strengthening their families and shaping their communities. As we shared in an newsletter sent last June, Dress for Success was founded on the belief that the socio-economic inequalities that have plagued our society for centuries need to be confronted and remedied in order to achieve our vision. Today, we lean deeper into our work in support of the fight against racial injustice and oppression and in support of our vision of a world where all women are treated with dignity and respect.

Two pandemics converged on a global scale that have illuminated the extent to which women we serve are vulnerable. Now, more than ever, is the time for all of us—every individual, organization, company and level of government—to do our

part to address the pain, poverty and righteous anger racial injustice has caused and the time to support, partner with and be part of organizations dedicated to social change and progress.

To the Black mothers, aunts, daughters and sisters we serve and work beside, know that we hear you, we see you and we will not stop advocating for you. Together, we can do more. Together, we can do better.

That's our re-commitment, and they aren't just affirming words. We *had* to take on this hard work in the midst of everything else we were juggling with the pandemic and our forced relocation.

We've been actively working to create a more equitable organization over the past several years and, in 2019, more formally identified it as a focus of our strategic plan.

We are reviewing our board nomination processes and organizational policies through a lens of diversity and inclusion, and we are committed to working toward a staff, volunteer corps and Board with compositions that reflect our clients' diversity. In fact, we hired an equity consultant to work with us at all levels of the organization. She

trained our Board on racial justice and worked with our executive director on a reorganization that expands opportunity for our staff and created an equitable and inclusive application screening and interview process. She has also helped us rebuild an inclusive volunteer program, as we return to in-person services.

Our work is not done, but we are making true on our commitment from one year ago. We hope you'll join us in this hard work.

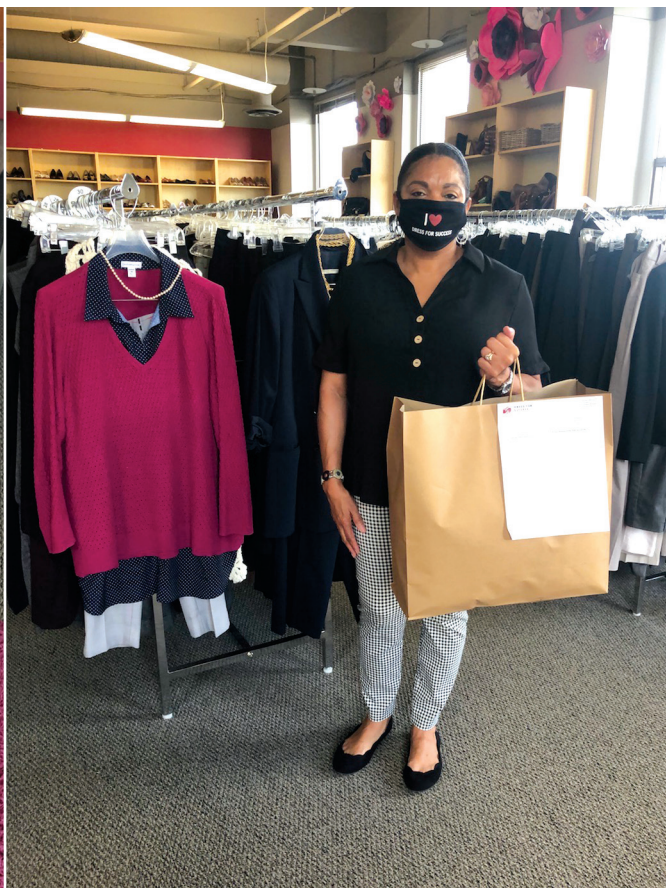
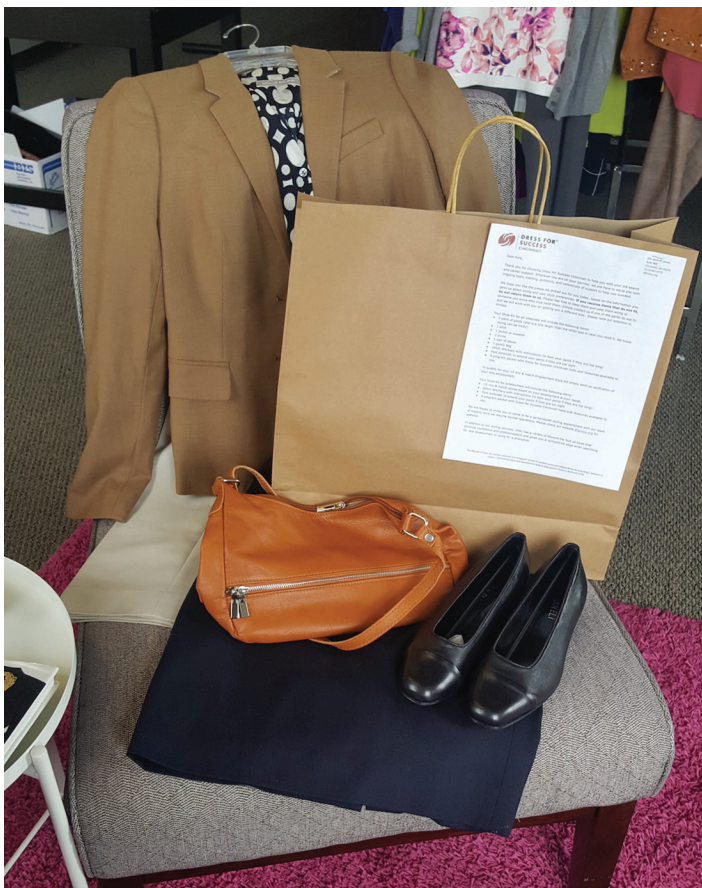
For the first time in our history, we are seeing what the Institute for Women's Policy Research calls a "shecession"—an economic downturn where job and income losses are affecting women more than men.

A recent CNBC report shared that more than 2.3 million women have left the workforce since February 2020. According to the National Women's Law Center, that brought women's labor participation rate to levels not seen since 1988. In December 2020 alone, women accounted for 100% of the jobs lost.

We are particularly aware that more and more women of color have been furloughed or laid off in our community. Even during the best economic conditions, poverty affects women of color the most. In fact, 20 percent of Black women live in poverty, as does one in three Black children. They are being hit especially hard by the economic fallout from the pandemic. Among people ages 20 and over, the unemployment rate in February 2021 was 8.9% for Black women and 8.5% for Latinas, whereas it was 5.3% for white men.

What's worse, the impact of women's unemployment is also unequal. Black women are more than two times as likely as white women to be the breadwinners of their families.

The Congressional Budget Office is projecting that employment won't return to pre-pandemic levels until 2024. That's three more years of women leaving the workforce at alarming rates.



How We Responded

Like many organizations, Dress for Success Cincinnati was forced to close our doors due to the 2020 COVID-19 Pandemic. With the support of donors, volunteers, clients and staff, we were able to quickly adapt.

We developed a Coronavirus Resources page on our website for up-to-date resources for navigating the pandemic. We mobilized our Program Participant Facebook Group to help our clients stay up to date with our service offerings, including Live Streaming, and moved our Professional Women's Group to virtual meetups.

Further, our clients participated in remote learning opportunities through Accenture's Skills to Succeed Learning Exchange, a free, highly interactive online training program to help find and sustain employment. Each Tuesday, we offered a virtual presentation to supplement individual learning on a select topic.

We developed a no-contact Style Kit pickup service to ensure women had the clothing and accessories they need to begin to get their careers back on track—even during a pandemic. And we offered Career Center appointments by phone or web conference to continue working with our clients on job searches, offering monthly mock interviews with corporate partners by phone and other support to help navigate any pandemic-challenges clients may experience.

In 2020, 378 women received an interview and/or employment styling; 92% of whom expressed increased confidence as a result of the experience, and 99% reported that they would recommend the experience to a friend. That total served is much lower than the number of women who are styled in a typical year. While we missed face-to-face contact with our clients for the last nine months of

2020, we received positive feedback on our Style Kits developed in response to the pandemic's closures.

We also know that pandemic affected more than our client's financial health. It also had a profound impact on their mental health. But among all the turmoil, there was hope—and success.

Jeweelen Lycan first came to Dress for Success for an interview suit back in 2018. Jeweelen was living in a shelter at the time. Today, thanks to support from Dress for Success, she is working full-time in property management, and looking at her future with a career focus. She recently signed up for a mock interview to prepare for a real interview she had later that same day for a position with better pay and benefits.

Jeweelen is still weighing her options to change jobs but shared that she wore the original interview outfit she got from Dress for Success, which gave her confidence during the interview. Furthermore, she has been clean from substance use for five years, recently purchased her own car, and hopes to pursue a long-term career in real estate and property management. She told the Times-Gazette, "If I can do it, anyone can. My life has completely changed. It was an illusion. I had to be shown that."

Every Number Tells a Story...

- 411 total women served in 2020. Due to the pandemic, this was the lowest number since 2000. We're preparing for a huge increase, similar to the recovery from the Great Recession when we served up to 1,800 women annually.
- Over 50% of our 2020 clients are single mothers.
- In post styling survey, 92% of expressed increased confidence as a result of the experience.
- 99% of clients report that they would recommend the DFSC experience to a friend.

Opening Our Doors in a New Location

Dress for Success will move in June 2021 to 4623 Wesley Avenue, Suite H in Norwood. The move comes as a result of a forced relocation from our downtown Cincinnati building, which is being converted to residential units. While we weren't looking to move, as our lease still had a few years left, we are using this as an opportunity to grow.

The new location allows for offices and meeting spaces, styling boutique, clothing donation center and our earned-income venture, resale boutique, Portulaca, to co-locate on one floor—instead of being spread out on multiple floors, as is the case in their old location. It also has meeting rooms large enough to host all of the organization's group programs on-site. Having such a large space gives us the chance to provide even more seamless delivery of client services and pushed us to dream bigger for ourselves.

We'll also be returning to in person services, including evening and weekend styling options. Our Career Center will again be available for drop-in use and staffed by our partner Cincinnati Works. Our return to in-person Professional Womens Group meetings will focus on coming back together in sisterhood and strengthening our support for one another. We'll also accept clothing donations at our new location every Monday through Thursday from 10 am to 5 pm.

To help raise funds for the relocation, Dress for Success embarked on the TransformHER Campaign—the first funding campaign in our 22-year history. The goal is to raise \$1.2 million. We are excited to share that we are nearly to the goal just a couple months since officially announcing the campaign. As of May 2021, we are nearly 90% to goal.

The campaign includes three prongs:

- Moving to a larger location that allows for cohesive programming and strategic growth
- Setting up a Fund for the Future which can only be distributed at the Board of Directors' discretion for new opportunities, programs and important growth
- Building fundraising capacity by establishing a Major Gifts program and recruiting a development director

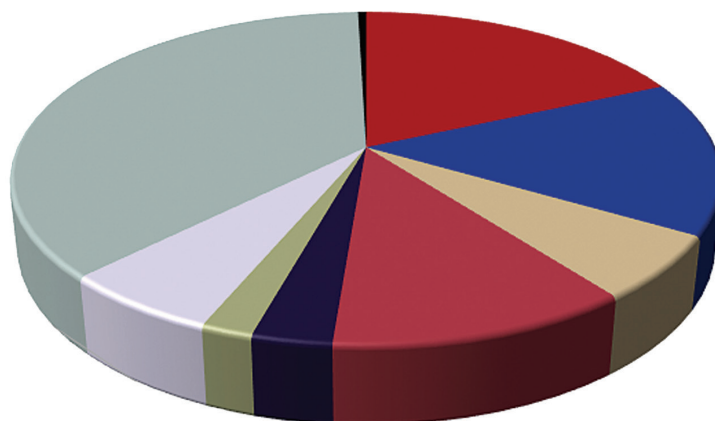

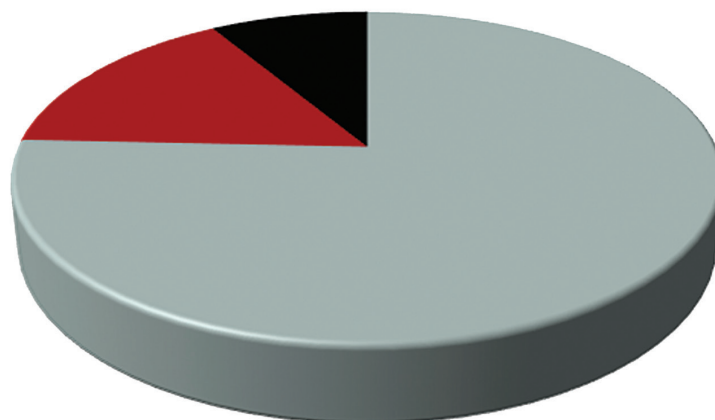
